"Wow, this is amazing!!" Those were the words of my 3.5 year old son, Liam, as we approached the ocean on our recent family vacation. As we walked together into the waves you could see the excitement, sense of wonder, and hint of fear in his face.

My one year old son, Kellen, while not old enough for words expressed the same thrill as he crawled without abandon straight from the safety of the shore into the water, not to be deterred at all by the relentless oncoming waves. When he was in about waist deep, he got up on his knees, lifted up his arms, and let out a shriek of joy.

Reflecting on these moments, I was reminded of a book written by Anne Lamott called *Help, Thanks, Wow: The Three Essential Prayers*. As the title of the book gives away, she says that there are three great, essential, prayers that we pray regularly, if not daily, in our lives. The third of those prayers, "Wow, is often offered with a gasp, a sharp intake of breath, when we can't think of another way to capture the sight of shocking beauty or destruction, of a sudden unbidden insight or an unexpected flash of grace."

"These wows come in all shapes and sizes," she says. There are lowercase wows, like crawling between clean sheets after a hard day, or like seeing a kid do a cannonball into the pool. There are uppercase wows, like the Grand Canyon or the destruction of a forest fire. There are wows brought on by listening to Mozart or standing in the midst of a carnival. There are wows brought on by extreme horror like war, or by unimaginable joy like a childbirth.

Whatever the source, I hope that during the course of this summer, you were able to say wow. That at some point you were blown away by something miraculous, or you were stunned to the place beyond words. In those moments when all we can muster is, "wow," we might be speaking our most honest and faithful prayer. A prayer that recognizes there is so much in the world that is bigger than us and our ability to comprehend.

"All the people were beside themselves with wonder. Filled with awe, they glorified God saying, "We've seen unimaginable things today." (Luke 5:26)

The public is encouraged to attend a discussion about the future of our community at the Village Hall on August 21, at 7 p.m. The Hinckley Planning Commission is updating the village 2003 Comprehensive Plan and Future Land Use Map, and invites public comments about the draft. These plans provide guidance for future development and land use in our village. The draft was developed by the Planning Commission after discussion and review of Comprehensive Plans of neighboring communities.

The draft includes 2020 U.S. Census data; several village goals and strategies for achieving them; and information about our village, businesses and public services. The Hinckley Plan is intended to outline and support the community's vision for development that improves the quality of life for residents. While it gives a snapshot of the community for anyone looking to move or start a business in Hinckley, the plan also gives village officials goals and possible strategies to achieving them.

While many elements of the 2003 plan have not changed in 20 years, the draft focuses on areas that still need action and narrows the footprint for development. It focuses on elements of our community that are a source of pride and that we want to continue.

Come and discuss the plan; share where you agree or have other ideas. Making improvements to our community begins with public input and a plan.
