Every new year brings with it this sense of excitement and opportunity. We have this chance to look forward to the months ahead to see where we want to go, who we want to be by this time next year. We make resolutions to lose weight or save money, to quit smoking or get a new job, to volunteer more or be less critical of others.

But honestly, how long do those resolutions usually last? I saw a statistic once that only about 8% of New Year's resolutions are successful to the end of the year, and nearly one quarter have been broken by the second week of January.

If I'm honest, as much hope as I'm usually filled with at the start of a new year, as determined as I usually am to set out on a new course, I also always am acutely aware that as much as I desire change it probably won't last. Because it's just not easy to change.

So what are we to do? We recognize that something in our lives needs improvement, something needs fixing, needs changing. But within weeks, we're usually back to where we were the year before. Our past catches up to us. We get caught in old habits. Our hope for a new beginning fades. So what do we do?

The biggest challenge I think we need to overcome in order to change, is to believe we actually can change. Donald Miller, who's an author I love to read, said that for the longest time in his life he believed this lie that "Life is something that happens to you, not something you can steer and alter."

"It's a crazy lie to believe," he says. But one that's so pervasive. We're not convinced we can actually change. We're set in our ways. Always tripping over the same obstacles. No matter how hard we try, we're always the same. Life just keeps on coming, and it's never any different.

But the truth of the matter is, that's not the way we were made. "Every healthy thing God created changes. God designed the world so that it is in constant motion, never sitting still, always dying and being reborn. Everything is changing, all the time."

It's the way of life. Soon, hopefully in a few short months, it will be spring again, for the millionth time. But it will be all new to us. And then summer and then fall, the world—life itself—is always changing, always starting over.

We're created to do the same. "Every night we lie down and go to sleep, go into an odd kind of coma for about 8 hours, and then we wake up and start another day." It's a mini-do-over, every 24 hours. The whole earth, each one of us, is starting over each and every single day.

Friends, you are not a fixed being. You are created to change. The whole world is created to change. Each day is a chance at a new beginning.

Do you believe that? That you can push the reset button, have a do-over, a fresh start? Not just because it's January, but because it's simply a new day.

Among the core missions of Lions Club International is our duty to provide quality programs for the detection, treatment, and rehabilitation of those with visual impairments. The Hinckley and Big Rock Clubs have focused on K-12 students with limited economic resources who have been identified by the school district with vision issues. The clubs jointly pay for the student's eye evaluation by a licensed optometrist and the recommended glasses to improve their vision and ability to learn.



When you support a Lions Club fundraiser, you are helping in our mission to serve our community. The club also collects used eyeglasses and recycles them with the help of Lions of Illinois Foundation for people around the world. Our collection box is located outside of the Hinckley Public Library. It's not uncommon to collect a hundred glasses over a couple of months. Young Artists Share Vision of Peace

As we enter a new year in our troubled world, the Lions Club was delighted to see the local entries in the 2024 Lions Peace Poster Contest. This international program encourages youth to dare to dream about peace, and create posters that are shared globally.

Nine HBR sixth-graders entered works-of-art with the encouragement of HBR Art Teacher Amy Decker. Lion Holly Hubert reports the poster of Nathan Kriesch won first prize with his poster titled "You can dream of anything, so dream of peace." Runner-Up artists were Piper Spencer and Collin Hellebrand. The club congratulates all of the young artists for their ideas and creative artwork.

Food Insecurity is Not Just at Holidays

We heard a lot about the needs of food pantries over the holidays. Unfortunately, food insecurity is a year-round issue for well over a million people in Illinois including many in our community. The Lions Club has found about 13 percent of DeKalb County residents lack reliable access to a sufficient quantity of affordable, nutritious food. The Lions Club has joined in efforts to donate to the Hinckley Area Food Pantry and encourages members to sort food for distribution at the Northern Illinois Food Bank in Geneva and pack meals at the Feed My Starving Children locations in North Aurora and in Sycamore.

The Lions Club will again be assisting with the distribution of free groceries in Hinckley on the first Tuesday of even-numbered months. The food items are supplied by the DeKalb County Community Gardens and Northern Illinois Food Bank for anyone who stops between 4 and 5 p.m.

The next visit is February 6. The Mobile will be parked in the First United Methodist Church parking lot, 801 N Sycamore St. Share the news and join in the effort to eliminate food insecurity.



Copies of Village Comprehensive Plan Available

Village News

The 2023 Hinckley Comprehensive Plan has been approved by the Village Board and copies are now available on the village website (Hinckleyil.com) and at the village office. The plan is an introduction to Hinckley for new businesses and residents, and provides an outline of goals and strategies the Village Board can use for improving our community.

The ideas and recommendations were drawn from public discourse, review of documents, and discussion by the Village Planning Commission over the past year that suggest a blueprint for managing growth and quality of life issues in the community.

The document consists of three parts: a history that includes an inventory of businesses; goals for improvements and tangible steps to realize that vision; and a land use map that details the preferences for land development as the community grows.

Village 2024 Budget Approved and Tax Levy Set

Action at the December 11 Village Board meeting approved the village budget for the year ahead and property tax levy that was within guidelines set by state law. The County Treasurer has established a property tax helpline to answer questions at 815-895-7337.
