There was a brief moment last month where a large percentage of our nation's populace stopped what they were doing long enough to look into the sky with intrigue. For some it may have been only for a few minutes in the midst of an otherwise busy day, but others drove hours to be in the path of totality in order to take the whole solar eclipse in with wonder. One of Hinckley's residents, Molly Ferguson, was one of those who travelled to the path of totality and wrote in a reflection on Facebook that "it is a transcendent experience... the air changes, the colors around you get muted. That orange ball of sun you see during the partial eclipse changes to something otherworldly that takes your breath away and makes you feel so small and so big in the universe all at the same time."

This past week I was watching my nearly two year old son. We were outside in the backyard enjoying the beautiful weather when I saw him crouched down looking at something on the ground. Curious, I kneeled down to see what caught his attention. It was a tiny ant going about it's day. I sat there and watched my son's face as he looked with intrigue and amazement. Not long later on that same day my older son picked a dandelion for me. Generally when one of my children hands me a dandelion I discard it as quickly and discreetly as possible. What do I want with a weed? But on this day, maybe because I was inspired by a child watching an ant, I saw that dandelion with renewed vision. I stopped and actually looked at it. I looked at the brilliant yellow petals for perhaps the first time since I was a child myself. I stood there and I stared and I was able to appreciate the beauty. I saw that weed for the token of love that my child saw it as, an object of beauty.

Each of these instances were a reminder to me of how often I cruise through life in a hurry. Our society has conditioned us to fast living, and a consequence of the rush of modern life is that we end up not truly seeing things as they really are. As Kirk Byron Jones writes in *Addicted to Hurry*, "Life has become a blurred procession of colorless images devoid of meaning and vitality."

But what if we actually slowed down long enough to actually see?

What if we took the time to be captivated by wonder or have our breath taken away or marvel at something truly beautiful?

What might our world become if we stopped long enough to recognize our place in this incredibly immense but also minuscule world?

What might our society become, or our community become, or our institutions and organizations become, if we slowed down and actually looked at people with generous eyes? If we saw them for who they really are rather than what we've been conditioned to see by all the talking heads of the world or led to believe by our hurried glances?

I think it would be, as Molly wrote about the eclipse, "a transcendent experience." And I for one, am going to try to slow down long enough to truly see.

We manage three scholarships for graduates--some to attend two years at a community college or trade school. The Larry Hoffman Scholarship was created in 2005 to remember this charter member. It provides \$3,000 per year for two years to a graduating senior. The Bill Frost Memorial Scholarship remembers this farmer who was a member of the first HBR FFA Chapter and supported the program during his life. The \$300 award goes to an outstanding graduate who was active in FFA. The third scholarship in memory of another HBR graduate, Jim Burnett, provides \$500 to recognize a student interested in agriculture and who has demonstrated their leadership abilities as Jim did. Take Time for Memorial Day on May 27

Hinckley will once again gather on Memorial Day to honor those who have given their lives in the service to our country. Come to the Community Building patio on Maple Street by 9:30 a.m. on May 27. Such remembrances have been held in many locations over the years including an area where the Dairy Joy sits today and at Greenwood Cemetery.

The Memorial Monument at the cemetery was erected in 1913 to honor those soldiers and sailors who served especially during the Civil War. When the granite monument was unveiled that year, a crowd of 3,000 people gathered. School children from every school in the township marched the mile from Hinckley to the cemetery led by the Aurora Drum Corp. A chorus of 100 children sang in tribute to the deceased and girls put flowers on the 20 military graves at that time. Annual Memorial Day services were held at the cemetery for many years.


Visit the military exhibit at the museum on May 27 too. An exhibit has the names of all local residents of which we know have served and those who gave their lives in defending our freedom.


Students Want to Know About the School Bells


