At Hinckley First UMC we've been talking the past month about the power of words. How our words have the power to build up or tear down, to delight or destroy, to praise or curse. A few weeks ago, I preached a sermon on the most difficult words to say. No, I didn't preach about Worcester Sauce... I preached about words like: I'm sorry, I was wrong, and will you forgive me?

As Rabbi David Winship writes, these are hard words to say not because they are the longest or the most complex. They are difficult, and perhaps even the hardest words to say, because they originate "way down in our gut. They are the type of word that is offered with emotion and which effects change in ourselves and in others." These words are heavy, they can be a burden, they don't just easily roll off the tongue. They are the sorts of words that take vulnerability to say, the sorts of words that require courage to admit, the sorts of words that demand we swallow our pride and embody humility.

I'll admit that I am absolutely no expert on saying any of these words. I hate to admit when I'm wrong, and find it very difficult to ask for forgiveness. So I turned to a book called *The Five Languages of Apology* by Jennifer Thomas and Gary Chapman to help me learn how to do this better.

Thomas and Chapman write about how in order to get better at saying these difficult words, we need to realize that apologies will feature five different languages. There is the language of expressing regret, the language of accepting responsibility, the commitment to make restitution, a promised plan to change, and a request for forgiveness.

Each of these aspects of an apology require us to put ourselves in the shoes of the other person and realize what we said or what we did caused them pain. We need empathy. We also need to swallow our pride and admit what we have done wrong by accepting and acknowledging we were wrong. This takes great humility. We need a changed behavior that backs up our words, because on their own our words don't hold ultimate power. We must change our ways, figure out how we can make it up to the person, and promise to never do the thing again. This takes vulnerability, sacrifice, and courage.

We all need to do better at speaking these difficult words. It's not just something that Christians are called to do, but something we are all called to do as a matter of civility and maturity. Relationships are far too precious for us to throw them to the wayside. Together we can do the difficult work of reconciliation and forgiveness.

## HBR CUSD #429 Updates and Highlights



HBR429 continues to "get personal"-- through personalized learning! We recognize that each student is an individual learner who may need individualized learning pathways in order to best meet their interests, increase their engagement, and foster their career development skills. In recent years, we have expanded the learning opportunities for our students. This month, we want to make sure that you are aware of the many avenues that students can expand their learning.

In 2018, Board Policy 6:135 was added to create the accelerated placement program. Options for Accelerated Placement programs include early entry to kindergarten or first grade, accelerated content area placement, accelerated grade level placement, and early graduation from Hinckley-Big Rock High School. Requests for content advancement, grade level advancement and early graduation from HBRHS must be submitted in writing to the building principal no later than December 31st for consideration for the following school year. School teams may also initiate the conversation with parents regarding any acceleration. New this year we have a cohort of 5th graders taking 6th grade math at the middle school. We continue to have a large number of 8th graders taking Algebra 1 and some 8th graders who travel to the high school for advanced placement in English and Biology. Through our personalized learning approach, we continue to target individual learners to meet them where they are and move them forward.

Another opportunity for advanced learning is provided through enrollment in college coursework while in high school. The district will pay for up to 2 (two) Waubonsee Community College (WCC) dual credit courses, per semester, per full-time eligible HBRHS student each school year, pending administrative course approval. Additionally, the district will pay for 1 (one) Edgenuity online course per semester for an eligible full time student, as determined by the student's educational team. High school students interested in pursuing the WCC course or Edgenuity online course options should meet with our Counselor, Mr. Abbs, for more information. Other students interested in taking an online course through Edgenuity to further their education should contact their building principal for more information.

As we strive to ensure that all of our students have meaningful learning experiences that grow them as learners and as citizens of the community, we welcome your input and ideas for expanded learning opportunities. Please send feedback or suggestions to <u>SuggestionBox@hbr429.org</u>.


